WARRANT FOR TOWN OF ACWORTH MARCH 14, 2017

To the inhabitants of the Town of Acworth, NH in the County of Sullivan in said state, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to bring your votes for Town Officers, and any other questions, to the Town Hall on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at 10:00 of the clock in the morning at which time the polls shall be opened for voting on Articles 1 and 2 by use of the official ballot, and shall close not earlier than 9:00 of the clock in the evening; AND you are hereby notified that discussion and voting on Articles 3 through 13 shall commence at 7:30 of the clock in the evening on the same day, March 14 next at the Town Hall.

ARTICLE ONE: To vote by non-partisan ballot for the following Town Officers:

Selectmen: 1 for 3 Year Term Tax Collector: 1 for 1 Year Term Treasurer: 1 for 1 Year Term Local Auditor: 1 for 1 Year Term Trustee of Trust Funds: 1 for 3 Year Term Library Trustee: 2 for 3 Year Terms Cemetery Trustee: 1 for 3 Year Term Budget Committee: 2 for 3 Year Terms Planning Board: 2 for 3 Year Terms Supervisor of the Checklist: 1 for 6 Years

ARTICLE TWO: To see if the Town will vote to amend the Acworth Zoning Ordinance language concerning Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs) so that it will be consistent with recently passed State legislation. This State mandated housekeeping measure will not change the intent of the Ordinance to allow ADUs. Copies of the complete text of the proposed amendment are available for review at the Town office. The question on the Official Ballot will appear as:

"Are you in favor of amending the existing Acworth Zoning Ordinance language allowing Accessory Dwelling Units so that it will be consistent with recently passed State legislation? This State mandated change will not change the intent to allow ADUs."

ARTICLE THREE: To see if the Town will vote to empower the Selectmen to serve as pound keepers, measurers of wood and fence viewers.

ARTICLE FOUR: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE FIVE: To see if the Town will vote to transfer \$8,000 from the Forest Maintenance Fund into the general fund. Said funds were derived from sustainable timber harvests managed by the Conservation Commission. ARTICLE SIX: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,427,081 for general municipal operations. This article does not include appropriations contained in special or individual articles addressed separately. Selectmen recommended \$1,434,581. The Budget Committee recommends this article. Majority vote required.

ARTICLE SEVEN: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$150,000 for the replacement of the Allen Road bridge with \$100,000 to be withdrawn from the Bridge Repair or Replacement Capital Reserve Fund established in 2014 and \$50,000 to come from Unassigned Fund Balance. The Budget Committee and Selectmen recommend this article. Majority vote required.

ARTICLE EIGHT: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,000 to be added to the Revaluation Capital Reserve Fund established in 2010. The Budget Committee and Selectmen recommend this article. Majority vote required.

ARTICLE NINE: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a used grader to replace the Town's 1983 grader for an amount up to \$160,000 with \$80,000 to be withdrawn from the Equipment Capital Reserve Fund, \$\$60,000 to come from Unassigned Fund Balance, and \$20,000 to come from taxation. The Budget Committee and Selectmen recommend this article. Majority vote required.

ARTICLE TEN: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000 for the purpose of increasing the 2017 contract cost to the Acworth Volunteer Fire and Rescue Company, Inc. The Budget Committee recommends this article. Majority vote required.

ARTICLE ELEVEN: To see if the Town will vote to discontinue, subject to gates and bars, the following two roads: Nelson Road from Derry Hill Road to the residence owned formerly by Nelson now by Bascom, and Echo Valley Road from Route 123A to the residence owned by Warburton. The effect of this vote will be to turn both roads into Class VI highways, not maintained by the Town, and subject to gates and bars, pursuant to RSA 229:5, VII and RSA 231:21-a.

ARTICLE TWELVE: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, indefinitely unless rescinded, to dispose of real property acquired by tax deed by auction, sealed bids, or otherwise as justice may require.

ARTICLE THIRTEEN: To transact any other business that may legally be brought before this Town Meeting.

2016 Tax Collector's Report

The Board of Selectmen issued warrants for the collection of 2016 property taxes in the amount of \$2,546,168.00. Tax Collector remitted to Town Treasurer \$2,360,068.76 in 2016 tax payments, 92.5 %, which is about the same as 2015, 91.5%.

In addition I received warrants for 2016 Yield Taxes in the amount of \$21,841.15 and 2016 Gravel Taxes for \$22.56. On 12/31/2016 the balance due on 2016 yield taxes was \$1,146.21.

I will mail the delinquency notice for the 2016 Taxes in early February, 2017 to delinquent taxpayers alerting them to their delinquency and to notify them of the lien date for 2016 Taxes: August 7, 2017.

All properties with uncollected 2016 taxes on August 7, 2017 will receive a Tax Lien regardless of the amount of taxes. Liens are an expensive proposition -18% interest plus various fees. Please pay.

The unpaid Tax levy of 2014 is scheduled for tax deeding on October 30, 2017. I recommend that those taxpayers start paying off immediately and contact me with their plan as to how they are going to deal with their tax debt. Having a plan in place is a stronger position when a tax deed decision has to be made.

In 2016, 41 real estate liens for the levy of 2015 were executed. 4 Tax payers were scheduled for Tax Deeding. 2 Waivers were issued to the Tax Collector by the Board of Selectmen for payment plans and 2 waivers for anticipated sale of properties. In the meantime those properties have been sold and all back taxes and interest collected. Please note: Tax Deed waivers can be rescinded with a thirty day notice and only the act of executing a tax deed to the Town of Acworth is waived. All back taxes and interest stay in effect.

Payments are entered as received on the day of the postal cancellation. You do not have to wait for a Monday to see me personally. Payments can be dropped off at the Town Offices, but I prefer that you put your payments in the mail. If everything else fails you can call me to make an appointment for when it is convenient for you.

New this year: The Tax Commitment and the Tax Bills are posted on the Acworth Town Clerk's web site. Thank you Charlotte!

Thank you to most of the taxpayers for your prompt payments and cooperation.

I enjoy performing my responsibilities and serving as Acworth's Town Clerk and have done so since 2004.

I want to take the opportunity to list some of the services available at this office for those of you that may be new in town. I am responsible for registering and titling vehicles. I complete marriage license applications, process birth, marriage and death certificates, file wetland permit applications, pole licenses and dog licenses. I accept voter registration forms, mail absentee ballots, prepare the town ballot and administer the oath of office to any newly elected or appointed Town Official. Notary Public services are also available. There is more information as well as various printable forms on the Town Clerk website at **www.acworthnhtownclerk.com**.

My office hours are Wednesday from 4:30 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. and Saturday morning from 8:00 to noon unless posted otherwise. If I close the office during these hours, I will post this information ahead of time either in the Acworth Community Newsletter, at the Acworth post office, the Acworth Village Store, town hall office and on the Town Clerk website.

It will soon be time to renew your dog licenses for 2017. The 2016 license will expire on April 30th. Beginning June 1st a \$1.00 per month late fee is assessed.

As a reminder, there is the option of renewing your registration and/or dog license or apply for a vital record copy on the Internet. To do this, go to the Town Clerk website, scroll down and select the appropriate icon and follow the step-by-step instructions.



Please be sure to make out two checks for vehicle registration and print out the confirmation. Make out one check to The Town of Acworth and the other to The State of NH DMV. Mail the confirmation in with your checks and keep a copy for yourself until you receive your registration in the mail. You are able to renew your registrations up to four months in advance.

If you do not have a computer and would like to access the Internet for these services, you could go to the village store or library.

2016 Selectmen's Report

Compliance, the revaluation and infrastructure absorbed most of the Selectmen's attention during 2016.

In 2008 the new owner of a parcel on Connecticut Heights Road began accumulating an assortment of motor vehicle and other materials. Town requests for compliance with driveway and building permits went unheeded and debris began to be deposited in the Town right of way. Without success the Town attempted to have a licensed junkyard established in order to control the increasing accumulation. In 2014 an abutter promised litigation against the Town for not enforcing the junkyard provision in our Zoning Ordinance. After two years the Town received a court order allowing it to proceed with a clean-up of the property. The court levied responsibility on other parties involved for some of the Town's expenses. Still this issue consumed considerable time, appearing on the Board's agenda each month in 2016.

Selectmen are charged with responsibility for property assessing. In the past that meant Board members assessing each property. Today the State's mandate to towns requires accuracy, fairness and accessibility to oversight. Assessing is computerized so it can be analyzed and evaluated. As a result towns employ assessing companies to maintain and update values. In 2016 the Town contracted with Municipal Resources, Inc. to conduct the 5 year, State mandated, values update. Although the contractor does the physical work of visiting and recording properties it falls to Selectmen to follow the work and approve the results. Our values update resulted in an increase in overall Town value driven mostly by an increase in residential and commercial properties.

The majority of the Board's time was spent on infrastructure in all its aspects. In two or three meetings each month Selectmen worked with highway supervisor Ed Babneau going over work completed and work planned, equipment repairs needed and personnel issues. Overseeing the Forest Road Bridge replacement, the Crane Brook Road project, a collapsed culvert on Crescent Lake Road and weekly in-house road maintenance took the most time at regular meetings. Developing cost effective ways to keep equipment running and supporting Ed in the human resources matters which are inherent in maintaining a work force filled out the Board's agendas.

Entering the Town's Sestercentennial year we can see progress. Clean up of an unlicensed junkyard is in sight, the Town is appreciating in value, Crane Brook Road is nearing completion, one bridge replacement is complete and the second is in preparation. Our greatest resource is all of those who work or contribute their time to keeping the Town going. Our meetings are posted and open to everyone. 2016 Highway Department Report

In addition to regular road and equipment maintenance the Highway Department was overseer of contracted work on Forest Road Bridge, Crane Brook Road and Crescent lake Road in 2016.

Grading, graveling and ditching started on Heino Road in April and continued through the season to Lynn Hill, Gove, Grout Hill, Ball, Black North, Livermore, Keyes Hollow, Underwood, Lufkin, Ryan, Bascom Farm, Sam Putnam, Campbell, Milliken Brook, Grange Hall, McLaughlin, Saw Mill, Meader, Royce and Nye Roads. Pot hole patching was done throughout the season on Cold Pond, Beryl Mountain, Forest, Charlestown and Derry Hill Roads. Tree clearing, road postings, Transfer Station cleanup and beaver dam control were all part of the year's regular road maintenance. The crew also worked on two areas which have needed attention for some time. The intersection at Derry Hill and Duncan Roads was reworked to accommodate truck traffic and the deteriorated pavement at the intersection of Beryl Mountain and Saw Mill Roads was replaced.

Equipment maintenance was one of the areas the department saved money. Trucks and heavy machines received regular shop maintenance and expenses for parts and repairs came in under budget over the year. Ed Babneau's Highway Supervisor biweekly reports tracked repairs for the Board of Selectmen. The unusually mild winter weather also allowed material savings which were put toward purchasing for 2017 projects at lower year end prices.

On capital projects, our crew worked with outside contractors on the reclamation and graveling of Crane Brook Road. The resulting saving allowed more drainage work to be completed than had been planned putting completion of the project within reach in 2018.

The collapse of a standing culvert on Crescent Lake Road was a reminder that the unexpected can alter the best laid plans. We were fortunate to find a company which had the right equipment and could fit the project into its late season schedule.

We had some turnover in personnel during the year with John Lyman and Ralph Campbell moving on to other employment. Don Porter and Scott Sanchas stepped in to help out with plowing. Ernie Porter has been with the department a few years now and Rodney Dupuis and Bob Stocker come on seasonally. The Garage phone hasn't changed, 835-6866. The messages are checked regularly and requests are addressed as soon as possible. Ed and the crew appreciate your support. Board of Selectmen for Acworth Highway

2016 Trustees of Trust Funds Report

"The Trustees of Trust Funds are fiduciaries and hold both public [Capital Reserve Funds] and private funds [Trust Funds] in trust for the purposes permitted by Statute." Handbook for Trustees, State of NH, Department of Justice, Charitable Trusts Unit. It follows that Trustees have a duty of loyalty, care, and obedience to uphold the laws and Constitution of the State. Taking the oath of office is a personal contract between the State of New Hampshire and the trustees. With this in mind the trustees devoted much attention to making sure the purposes of the trusts and capital reserve funds were respected.

The trustees held five meetings during 2016 on: January 25, April 18, May 23, June 20, and July 11. During the year our bank (RBS Citizens Bank) announced plans to implement a "revision of financial management transactional systems". This revision has been introduced, implemented, and is now successfully operating. Cyber- security and functionality of complex financial transactions between bank and trustees have been updated and improved.

The amount of interest income for all accounts (both private and public) rose steadily over the year with six interest rate increases. Beginning in January 2016 the rate was 0.01% by December the interest rate was 0.65%.

The annual seminars for all trustees and town officers were held throughout the state, sponsored by the Charitable Trust Unit of the State of N.H. Department of Justice one of which we attended and in which we participated. This annual seminar enables us to keep up with changes, amendments, court cases, and Attorney General's opinions relating to statutes; that is a significant part of our job description. The participatory format of the seminars allows us to hear from many other trustees; learning from their mistakes, experiences, and interactions with other town officials.

2016 Librarians' Report

Acworth Silsby Library had 3800 visits from patrons and visitors in 2016 and welcomed 26 new patrons. We circulated 4407 books during the year and continue to add fiction, non-fiction, children's books and DVDs to our collection monthly.

We had 549 patron visits for computer use in 2016. We have a high speed DSL internet connection and computers for public use as well as a wireless connection. Patrons use our computers for a variety of activities such as checking e-mail, looking for jobs, preparing school work, researching hobbies and interests.

The Acworth School students and teachers visit the library weekly during the school year. At Halloween, we gave each student a book as well as treats.

We had a summer reading program in which 22 young readers participated. Each participant received the gift of a new book from the Library. We hosted Games from Around the World presented by the Mariposa Museum in July.

We have two Reading Groups meeting monthly, one is reading classics and the second is reading general fiction. New members are always welcome.

Our annual Book Sale was held in July, raising additional funds for the Library. We thank all who participated either by donating or purchasing books. We have have an ongoing book sale set up in the small meeting room of the Town Hall. Please check it out. In 2017, book donations will be accepted at the Library after June 1st.

We are an active member of the Nubanusit cooperative, which provides a collection of movies that rotate bi-monthly among 22 local libraries. Patrons borrowed 115 Nubanusit DVDs during 2016.

Inter-library loans (ILL) continue to be a popular way for patrons to read books not owned by our library. We have access to books at all NH libraries and many of the NH college libraries. A total of 790 books circulated via the ILL system.

2016 Cemeteries Report

Acworth's cemetery trustees and sexton meet between April and November on the fourth Thursday of the month at 4 PM in the town hall. Visitors are always welcome.

Again this year we received an inquiry from a town resident about home burial. New Hampshire does not prohibit burials on private property, but does require that the landowner provide a detailed map showing the burial location to the cemetery trustees, and to be placed in the property file in the town office. A description of the burial location becomes part of the property deed. Future landowners must permit descendants of the deceased to enter the property to visit the grave of their relative. Thus burying human remains on privately owned land becomes a permanent encumbrance on the property. Scattering cremains or ashes is not problematic.

Green burial, without embalming or a cement vault, is permitted in the Acworth cemetery. Resources for people interested in foregoing the services of funeral homes can be found at <u>www.grievinggreen.com</u> and at <u>www.nhfuneral.org</u>.

The cost of a cemetery plot has now increased by \$50 to cover the increase in the price of cornerstones (now \$200 per set) from the Keene Monument Company. A six by twelve foot lot, adequate for one full-body burial, now costs \$400, and a twelve by twelve foot lot (space for two full-body burials) costs \$550. A twelve by twenty-four foot lot is priced at \$1050. Three sets of cremains can be interred in the space normally taken by a single full-body burial. Purchasers are actually buying the right to inter, not the plot of land itself, which cannot be sold to a third party, but only sold back to the town for the original price at which it was purchased.

We expect that our antique horse-drawn hearse, presently stored in a privately-owned barn, can be moved to the church-owned horse sheds near the town pound next year in time for the celebration of Acworth's 250th anniversary on August 12, 2017.

In May a severe windstorm felled a large maple limb in the cemetery near Hill Road. Unidentified volunteers cut up the limb and cleared it away. While we appreciate good intentions, cemetery sexton Kris Fenderson needs to pre-approve any cemetery work in order to ensure that no monuments are damaged in the process. This fall we had two enormous dead maples removed from the Hill Road Cemetery and expect that expenses for tree removal will continue to be a major expense in our budget.

The September 18th Cemetery Walk featured trustee Claudia Istel portraying Edith Kemp, Acworth's first woman selectman. Denise Lindgren played Sally Miner Pearson. John Luther and Sandra Binion played Harvey and Belle Lincoln, and Dennis and Sally Eaton impersonated Captain Woodbury and his wife, early owners of their home at the southwest edge of the town Common. Members of Acworth' Female Charitable Society re-enacted the formation of their organization two hundred years ago, in 1816, the year without a summer.

The Acworth Fire Company has been busy this year with a total of 110 calls up from 85 last year.

We started 2016 with two structure fires. We also responded to a number of auto accidents on Route 123A and River Road due to increased speed after the repaying.

The majority of our calls were medical. Medical supply costs have increased and we are required to carry additional provisions such as Epi-Pens and Narcan.

The Company has requested additional funding this year because of those increases along with increases in training, insurance and communications. Please keep that in mind as you vote.

2016 Planning Board Report

During the year the Planning Board addressed applications for two annexations, one subdivision, two nonresidential site plans and for utility cutting on scenic roads. The process for each of those involved notifying abutters and holding public hearings. In addition the Board held a Joint Board Meeting and met with Selectmen to update the Town's Capital Improvement Plan.

The spring Joint Board Meeting is an opportunity for Town boards to discuss plans and areas of concern together. In 2016 the conversation covered road conditions and the difficulty of maintaining current spending levels, permitting structures including greenhouses and the responsibility of landowners to maintain driveway culverts.

Road spending was revisited during the Capital Improvement Plan update in October. In order to get to roads which are deteriorating an increase in capital spending was recommended by both the Selectmen and Planning Board. The projected increase would allow work to take place on more than one road seasonally.

For some time there has been a question as to whether small structures should require permitting. The Joint Boards Meeting consensus was to continue permitting all structures because it assures compliance with setbacks in addition to serving as an assessing tool. In follow up work which included researching other towns' regulations, the Planning Board came to consensus that permitting of greenhouses also be consistent with other structures in order to maintain setback requirements.

During the year the State adopted legislation allowing accessory dwelling units. Cities and towns were given a window in which to make their regulations consistent with the new State law. The Planning Board reviewed the ADU provisions it endorsed in 2015 and presented updated language to be included in the 2017 ballot bringing the Town into compliance.

Currently the Planning Board is working on eliminating inconsistencies between the definitions used in the Town Zoning Ordinance and Subdivision Regulations. The Board also plans a review of the Master Plan goals in preparation of the 2018 plan update.

Board member Henry Sipple agreed to serve as the Town's commissioner to the Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Regional Planning Commission. His attendance at regional planning meetings is a useful link to resources and information.

The Planning Board meets monthly and all are welcome. Alternate member positions are available. Acworth Planning Board

2016 Conservation Commission

This year the Acworth Conservation Commission completed the work connected with Nancy Hamblet's donation of 5.48 acres on the Keyes Hollow Road, a gift approved at last year's town meeting. That parcel has now been added to the Acworth wetlands, under a conservation easement held by the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests. Costs for surveying the entire 76-acre Acworth Wetlands and expenses for deeding the Hamblet easement were paid from our Conservation Fund. That fund contains half the income generated from the Land Use Change Tax, paid to the town by purchasers who convert land out of current use. We can also use the fund to assist landowners placing conservation easements on their privately owned property. Again this year we also contributed \$500 for tuition assistance for Acworth children attending summer camps at Alstead's Orchard School.

The Gove Town Forest generates income for the town through managed timber harvests. Last year ash trees were cut in advance of anticipated damage from the emerald ash borer. The timber harvest on the steeper potion of Gove Hill will be completed this year when the ground freezes. Our town meeting warrant includes an article transferring \$8,000 from the Conservation Commission's Forest Maintenance Fund -- proceeds from last year's ash cut -- to the town's general fund.

Much of our work this past year focused on monitoring and photographing conservation easements and reporting the results to the easement holders. New Hampshire's Land Conservation Incentive Program, managed through the state Office of Energy and Planning, holds easements on 1,362 acres of private land in Acworth, including forest, sugar orchard, and farm land. The Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests also holds easements on numerous private lands, as well as 372 acres of town-owned forest and wetlands, where hunting is permitted, and the privately owned 529-acre Black North easement, open to the public for hiking, bird-watching, and snow-mobiling on established trails. The town is fortunate so preserve to much open land, and to offer such a wide expanse for public enjoyment.

Each spring the Conservation Commission organizes an annual Green-Up Day. We are grateful to the schoolchildren, 4-Hers, and youth groups who cleaned up trash, and to the many townspeople who regularly pick up roadside litter near their homes.

The Acworth Conservation Commission meets the second Wednesday of each month at 7 PM in the town hall. We review logging permits (Intents to Cut) and communications from the state Department of Environmental Services such as septic permits and dredge and fill applications. We also receive invitations to many statewide events related to conservation, wildlife, and forestry. Members of the public are always welcome to attend. Please let us know if you are interested in becoming an alternate member.

2016 Crescent Lake Association Milfoil Committee Report

Crescent Lake Association conducted over 1075 courtesy boat inspections during the 2016 summer season. Our Lake Host program, one of the most effective in the NH Lakes program continues to have a positive impact on the water quality of Crescent Lake, even though we know we are the "last defense" in mitigating invasive species (plants & animals) from the lake.

Crescent Lake Association employed 6 full-time Lake Hosts in 2016 and welcomed the return of several paid hosts and volunteers from the 2015 season. Our program works due to the very exacting training the Lake Hosts get from NH Lakes Association and the diligence each brings to every shift. The total program costs continue to rise while the incident of invasive plant and animal life creeps closer to the shore of Crescent Lake from elsewhere. In 2016 a 27" walleye fish was caught, which undoubtedly came from the Connecticut River (where it is known to inhabit) and several "domestic" ducks were left by some persons who thought Crescent Lake might be a good home. Unfortunately, the ducks' wings had previously been clipped and they had to be captured and removed prior to ice settling in. The ducks fought off attacks by other predators this season and we hope folks will understand the need to keep certain species in their native locales and not "dropped off" at the public access point simply because it is convenient for them.

Our 11% rise in boat traffic in 2016 represents what we believe to be a trend in recreational boating with the popularity of kayaks and stand-up paddleboards, along with the usual power boat traffic. For 2017, NH DES will enforce a new law, prohibiting the trafficking of invasive weeds and mandating boaters drain their vessels in the body of water they have just visited before leaving – this is intended to prevent "cross-pollination" of water from one body of water to the next. We'll report next season on the success of this new law.

The \$2,000.00 annual financial contribution from Acworth goes a long way in supporting our program and we hope you will continue to support us at the same level or **increase your support**. The 757 paid Lake Host hours continue to present a challenge in inspecting each and every boat arriving at the Crescent Lake Road ramp. The costs to operate the Aquatic Invasive Species Program continue to rise and we look to every avenue to keep our costs in line with the expected benefit of a clean Crescent Lake. We are always grateful for your continued support.

2016 Merger Notice

If you owned real estate lots that were involuntarily merged, you may be able to have those lots restored to their pre-merger status.

Your property may qualify if:

Two or more lots were merged without your consent for zoning, assessing or taxation purposes;

No previous owner consented to the merger.

To restore your property to pre-merger status you must: Make a request to the Board of Selectmen no later than December 31, 2021.

Once restored:

Your properties will again become separate lots; however, they must still conform to existing land use ordinances.

This Notice shall be posted in a public place from January 1, 2012 until December 31, 2021 and be published in the Town's Annual Report from 2011 through 2021.
